



To help us continue providing these memorable opportunities, we kindly ask each family to contribute £10 towards our School Fund.


This donation will go directly towards:

We are introducing a new way for children to celebrate their birthdays at school! On their birthday (or as close as possible if it falls on a weekend or during half term), children will be allowed to wear their own clothes to school.

# Uniform

### Swimming Provision 2025-2026



#### Who?

All children in Years 2-6 will receive swimming sessions this academic year.

#### When & Where?

We will have a pop-up swimming pool on the Junior Playground in Summer I for 6 weeks. Each child will receive at least  $6 \times 30$  minute swimming lessons.

#### Why?

The PE Curriculum requires all schools to provide swimming instruction in either KSI or KS2: All children should be able to: swim 25 metres by the end of KS2, be fully water confident, possess basic lifesaving skills and use a range of strokes effectively.

The DFE highlights swimming as statutory for health, safety, and physical development.



- √To have selected a sponsor, who must be Catholic

Each class has a special saint who is their role model. The children learn about their saint's life, why they are important today, and how we can follow their example. On their feast day, children can:


- Wear their own clothes to celebrate

#### Year 5 and Year 6: Supporting Your Child's Learning at Home

As parents and carers, you play a vital role in supporting your child's education. Encouraging good homework habits helps your child to build confidence, independence, and a positive attitude towards learning. Homework is an important extension of what your child is learning in class and helps consolidate key knowledge and skills.

We kindly ask that you support your child with the following tasks each week:

- ✓ Reading Your child should read each night. Please sign their reading diary at least three times per week.
- Spelling Practice Complete at least 10 Spelling Shed activities each week to help reinforce spelling patterns.
- ✓ Times Tables Practice Spend at least 20 minutes per week on Times Table Rock Stars (TTRS) to build speed and accuracy.
- $\checkmark$  Weekly Comprehension Task Complete the comprehension exercise provided to support reading skills and understanding. Handed out Thursday due back in the following Thursday.
- $\checkmark$  Weekly Maths Task Complete the maths task set to reinforce key concepts covered in class. Handed out Thursday due back in the following Thursday.

Thank you for your continued support. By working together, we can help your child develop strong learning habits and feel confident in their learning.


### Reading for Pleasure



Reading for pleasure is one of the most powerful ways you can support your child's learning and wellbeing. When children enjoy reading, it has a lasting impact not just on their education, but on their confidence, imagination, and language skills.

# Reading for Pleasure



#### Why is reading for pleasure so important?

Boosts learning: Children who enjoy reading often do better in all subjects—not just English!

Builds vocabulary: Regular reading introduces children to new words and ideas.

Develops empathy and imagination: Stories help children see the world through different eyes.

Supports wellbeing: Reading can be relaxing and calming, helping children feel safe and focused.

Creates special moments with family: Shared reading time builds stronger connections at home.

#### How you can help:

Read with your child regularly - even a few minutes a day makes a difference.

Let your child choose books they enjoy - comics, magazines, audiobooks all count!

Talk about stories together – ask questions and share your own opinions. Be a reading role model – let your child see you reading too.

# Shining Light Award

Each week, we celebrate two children in every class with a Shining Light Award. This special award recognises children for their good effort, good work, or positive behaviour.

The award winners will receive a certificate to take home and share with their family. In addition, they will be given a 'gold tie' to wear for two weeks as a visible symbol of their achievement.

This award is inspired by the words of Jesus in Matthew 5:14, "You are the light of the world," reminding us that every child has a light within them that can brighten the lives of others through their actions and attitude.

Over the course of the academic year, we hope that every child will have the opportunity to receive this award.

### Behaviour Stars



- Every Friday, the children are given the opportunity to reflect on their own behaviour and how well they have demonstrated our behaviour values and expectations see next slides.
- If they feel they have done a good job with this, they are awarded a star sticker and a stamp in their communication diaries.
- Stars are displayed in every classroom with the behaviour expectations around them.
- Once the children had earned a certain number of stars, they first receive their behaviour certificates and then they receive their Behaviour Badge for maintaining their excellent behaviour.

 We are proud to be an inclusive school, where every child is valued and supported to achieve their full potential. We celebrate the diversity of our community and ensure all pupils have access to high-quality teaching and learning.



- We use the graduated approach to meet the needs of pupils with SEND:
- Quality-first teaching and classroom strategies
- Targeted interventions where needed
- Personalised support from our SEND team

- We work closely with a range of external professionals to ensure the best possible support for our pupils. These include:
  - Pupil and School Support (PSS) providing advice on learning and progress
  - Communication and Autism Team (CAT) supporting pupils with autism and social communication needs
  - Educational Psychologist (EP) offering specialist assessment and guidance
  - Occupational Therapy (OT) helping with physical, sensory and fine motor needs
  - Speech and Language Therapy (SaLT) supporting communication and language development
  - Compass providing emotional health and wellbeing support
- These services also host coffee mornings throughout the year, giving parents the chance to share concerns, ask questions and receive tailored advice. We are committed to working in partnership with families and professionals to help every child thrive.



How to speak to the SENDCO if you have a concern:

### Attendance



Every minute counts

Frequent absence can add up to a considerable amount of lost learning and can seriously disadvantage your child in adult life.


- 5 minutes late every day means around 3 days of education are missed.
- A score of 90% in a test would be a good result but 90% attendance means that a child will have missed around 100 lessons over a school year.

### Secondary School Transfer Information


- You can list up to six different secondary schools as preferences in your application. This
  can include schools outside of Birmingham.
- Birmingham City Council runs a co-ordinated admissions scheme with neighbouring local authorities.
- If you are applying for schools in another local authority then we recommend that you contact them for their admissions arrangements as this will help you to decide if your application is likely to be successful.
- Birmingham City Council will only deal with applications for school places if you live in Birmingham and pay council tax to the authority.
- If you live in Birmingham your application must still be made to Birmingham City Council, even if applying to schools outside of Birmingham.

### Secondary School Transfer Information



- You must read the admission arrangements for the secondary schools you are interested in to see how likely it is that your child will be offered a place there.
- How close you live to a school is very important. Schools have cut-off distances which change each year based on demand.
- Schools may have open sessions or evenings that you can attend to have a look around the school or instead hold virtual events throughout September. Visit the schools' own website for further details.
- If your child has special educational needs or a disability (SEND) consider whether your chosen schools are suitable for their specific educational needs. Talk to school staff at the open days or evenings where they are taking place or contact them via other methods such as by phone or email.

#### Grammar Schools



- If your child will be sitting the selective test for entry to grammar schools, we **strongly** recommend that you do not submit your online application until you know the results of your child's grammar school test.
- The test results for grammar schools in Birmingham will be available before 31 October.
- Once you have received your child's test score for the Grammar Schools in Birmingham, if you still want to apply for a grammar school, it is essential that you list it as one of your preferences in your online application. Make sure you also check the admission arrangements as most of The Grammar Schools in Birmingham still operate catchment areas.

#### Grammar Schools




- Do not lose the opportunity to list other school preferences before knowing the results from the selective test. We are aware that with grammar schools in other local authorities you may not receive your test scores after the closing date to apply for your preferences (31 October). However, online applications must be submitted by 31 October to be classed as on time. Therefore, you must ensure that if you are applying for a grammar school in another local authority you include it as a preference on your application.
- If you apply after the final closing date of 31 October your application will be considered as a late application and will not be processed until after the offer of places on 3 March 2025. Late applicants are less likely to be offered a place at one of their preferred schools.

#### Applications



- Applications open on I September for secondary school applications for entry in September 2026. The closing date is 31 October at II:59pm.
- You will receive an email confirmation that you have submitted your application form. Check this to make sure everything is correct.
- You can amend your preferences right up to midnight on the closing date.

#### Transfer Process - Tips



- Refer to Birmingham City Council website for information on schools and the transfer process.
- Using the online application process, identify six different schools you would like your child to attend.
- Rank your six preferences in the order of schools you most prefer.
- Check the online booklet to make sure your child meets the entry criteria for the schools you prefer.
- Has your child satisfied the entry criteria for the past 2 years?

#### Transfer Process - Tips



- Make sure that you choose at least one school where your child meets ALL entry requirements.
- List your choices in order of preference (include grammar schools and schools in other authorities).
- Give the name and date of birth of any brother or sister who is already at a school you are applying to.
- Check how far you live from the schools you prefer (by straight line measurement in Km or m). Help can be obtained from Admissions and Appeals on 0121 303 1888.


- You must apply online. All relevant information, including the Secondary Education Booklet which outlines this process, is available from:
- www.birmingham.gov.uk/schooladmissions
- If you do not have access to the internet, you can make an appointment to complete the form here.

## Information to Note



- You must complete the form belonging to the local authority that you pay council tax to. List any schools (regardless of authority) on this form. The only exception to this is independent schools who must be contacted directly.
- You must only fill in one form.

## Information to Note



If you live in Birmingham and list only one school as a preference, and your child cannot be offered a place at that school, then a place will be offered at an alternative school. This will be one of the nearest schools with a place available after offers have been made to all other applicants who applied on time. It is well worth listing more than one preference even if you are confident that your child will be offered a place at a certain school based on previous years' admission patterns. Due to demographic changes from year to year, there is no guarantee that a pattern will continue in future.
